### Before You Read

Before you read "The King and the Shoemaker," go over the words below. Make sure you know what each word means. This will help you when you read the story.

soldier: someone who fights for a king or others. The soldier had been fighting all day.


**sword:** something used for fighting. He killed three men with his *sword*.

**sharp:** having an edge that cuts easily, You can cut your hand on something that is *sharp*.

blade: the hard, cutting part of a sword. The blade of the sword was hard.

palace: the place where a king or queen lives. The queen lives in a palace.

"Oh, yes," the shoemaker said. "I was able to eat. I got money for food."


"You did? Tell me how," said the king.


