What will be done with your remains?

- Planning ahead for one's own burial typically involves two main choices. Do I wish to be buried in a coffin or in an urn? If you haven't chosen your gravesite, there are plenty of alternatives for memorable burials.
- 2. Some people want to be buried at sea. Scattering ashes into a local ocean or lake is common. Sometimes whole bodies are lowered into the sea. In 2011, Osama bin Laden was reportedly buried at sea within hours of being killed by US forces. Officials said his body had to be buried within 24 hours in order to comply with Islamic tradition. Was a sea grave the only safe option for the world's most wanted man? John F. Kennedy Jr. had a sea burial after his plane crashed. He was an avid swimmer and sailor, and the water burial brought closure to those who loved him.
- 3. Do you know that you could also be buried in space? Pay the big bucks and *Celestis* will launch your **cremated remains** into earth's orbit or deep space. The cremated remains of Star Trek creator Gene Roddenbury were **launched** into space in 1997.
