DEFORESTATION

Do we need a **clear-cut** plan?

- Deforestation refers to the **destruction** and **conversion** of forests. Humans are largely responsible for the loss of forests. The cleared land is used for farming, housing, businesses, mining, and roads. The resources are used for building materials, fuel, medicine, food, and paper. According to some estimates, up to half of the world's tropical rain forests have already been cleared for these purposes.
- The majority of the earth's plants and animals live in forests. Deforestation disrupts the food chain. What will come of the remaining species if we **eliminate** their **habitat**? According to some experts, we will soon find out. Based on the current rate of deforestation, the world's rain forests could vanish within 100 years.
- 3. How did humans let this happen? Survival is the main reason. Converting forests to agriculture is the leading cause of deforestation. Farmers use **clear-cutting** to make land available for livestock and crops. They rely on the income and the resources for survival.
