Are you passionate about your work?

1. How important is it to love your work? Some people say it's the key to happiness. You spend so much time at your job that it has to be something you're **passionate** about. Other people say you have to at least feel **valued** in your workplace. Your dream job may still be a hobby, but the work you do must make a difference in people's lives.
2. Is it possible to adore your job no matter what you do? Your **attitude** toward your job can go a long way. A supportive **pest control** worker or **plumber** improves the quality of life of his customers. Feeling **challenged** on the job is important. A job that requires very little effort is hard to do for a long time. This is why some positions have a **high turnover**. Your night job may be a **stepping stone** to your future career.
3. The people we work with have a lot to do with job satisfaction, too. You may be passionate about the work but hate your boss or coworkers. On the other hand, you may work from home but miss interaction with **colleagues**.
4. The money you earn on the job is also important. Do you earn enough money to meet your basic needs? Is there a little left over for your savings and recreation account? If you think you deserve more than you earn, you may be miserable at work. Asking for a raise may be your solution. Some people get stuck in a **rut** at work.
