Reading

DRONES

Robot assassin or modern air patrol?

- Drones are unmanned aerial vehicles (UAVs) operated from the ground. Some drones are used for **surveillance**. Others are armed for targeted attacks. Several countries have military drones in use, including the US, the UK, Israel, and China. The US has hundreds of drones in active use, and drone technology is spreading fast. When an American drone was **captured** in Iran in 2011, many feared the technology would be copied. This is called reverse-engineering.
- 2. Are targeted killings by drones legal? Many people don't think so. A recent study suggests that drones kill far more innocent **civilians** than targeted leaders. One UN investigator believes that drone strikes are a war crime. He believes that terrorists should be captured, not murdered.
- 3. What does it feel like to live under drones? Citizens in countries like Pakistan and Afghanistan say they live in fear of drones. They describe the **terrorizing** sound that drones make above their homes and businesses. Drones have powerful weapons that leave homes, buildings, and victims unidentifiable. In Pakistan, many people say they are anti-American because they oppose America's use of drones.
- 4. What about the drone pilots on the ground? Are these true combat pilots? Psychologists say that these pilots experience an odd form of trauma called **whiplash transition**. They go from a **virtual** war zone to regular family life with no time in between.
- 5. Not all drones are used in warfare. Drones are sometimes used to assess damage after natural disasters. In 2011, drones were used to assess radiation levels after the Fukushima power plant accident. Police forces are experimenting with drones for domestic use. Drones may be policing the skies above your home already. What happens when an average Joe can build a drone that interrupts a commercial flight?
