GIFT GIVING

- 1. Which do you **prefer**, giving or receiving? Do you prefer to give store-bought or handmade gifts? Some people prefer receiving gifts from the heart, such as homemade cookies. Others like gifts of **experience**, like concert tickets. Do you prefer **cash** or gift cards?
- 2. The culture of gift giving differs around the world. In Japan, it is important to carefully **wrap** a gift. You offer a gift with two hands, and you don't open it in front of the gift giver. In China, it is **customary** to refuse a gift a few times. In contrast, Canadians usually open gifts right away unless they are waiting for a special occasion like Christmas. Throughout North America, people spend a lot of money on Christmas gifts. They also **return** many of the gifts they receive.

*The Gift of Tulips

The tulip bulbs were a thankyou gift to Canada for helping free the Netherlands during World War II and for giving Dutch Princess Juliana and her two daughters a safe place to live. This gift became a tradition. The Dutch continue to send 20,000 bulbs to Ottawa each year!

Word Forms

The word **gift** can be used as a noun (*a thing you give someone*) or a verb (*to give a gift*).

- I have to go to the store to buy a gift.
- We gifted our friends with homemade jam.

The word **present** is also a *noun* or a *verb*. As a noun, *present* is a synonym of *gift*. As a verb, *present* is more formal and usually used with awards or achievements.

- The baby received so many presents this Christmas.
- We presented the winner with a trophy.

Prefer is a verb that means "to like better." Note the use of *to, over,* and *or* in some of the following patterns.

Form	Examples	
prefer + noun	 I prefer gift cards. She prefers gift cards to cash. We prefer homemade gifts over store-bought gifts. 	
prefer + gerund/infinitive	 He prefers giving to receiving. Do you prefer buying or making gifts? Do you prefer to buy your own gift or to buy a group gift?

Take turns choosing two "gifts" from the box. Give the "gifts" to someone in your class. Ask the person who receives the gifts which they prefer? Remember to say thank you.

Ex. gift card, new puppy

- Student A (gift giver): Which do you prefer, a \$100 gift card or a new puppy?
- Student B (receiver): I prefer a new puppy to a gift card! Thank you.
- Student A: You're welcome!

Repeat until every student has a gift. Now, does anyone want to return their gift? Does anyone want to exchange gifts?
