VOLUNTEERING *Changing the world one step at a time*

Oxymorons

Explain to students that phrases made up of contradictory terms are often used in literature or for dramatic effect. Ask students if similar techniques are used in their own language(s).

Answers will vary. Possible answers:

- An open secret is something that is intended to be private, but is known by many. For example, two people may be in a romantic relationship, but have not announced it publicly. While the relationship may still be "a secret," it is evident to those around the couple. This is an oxymoron because "secrets" are private, but "open" information is available to all.
- When applying for a visa or a job, you are sometimes requested to show an **original copy** of a passport or a diploma. You must show the original documents, not photocopies. In this phrase, "copy" refers to the original, not to a duplicate. However, the two words together, "original" and "copy" seem to mean opposite things.
- An only choice does not involve choosing. If there is only one thing available, there is no choice. It is also common to hear the phrase "only option."
- We say the phrase act naturally when we don't want people to notice something. In the example, the people might have committed a crime and they don't want the police to know they did it. The phrase is an oxymoron because acting is fake, so it is in opposition to being natural.
