Paying a price for the big day

- Saying "I do" is a big deal. It is also a big expense. Celebrities spend more than a million dollars on their big day. These marriages rarely last forever. Everyday people also get carried away. Many couples can't afford their dream wedding. They have student loans or credit card debt. This doesn't stop them from tying the knot.
- 2. Weddings these days are often **funded** by friends and families. Members of the **wedding party** host events like **greenback** (money gift) showers or **Jack and Jill parties**. The money that is received goes toward the wedding reception or photographs. It may also go toward a **honeymoon**. Some parents even take out a **second mortgage** to pay for their child's wedding.
- 3. Most couples have difficulty sticking to a wedding **budget**. They may choose an **open bar** because that's what their friends expect. There may also be **pressure** from the family to lengthen a guest list. No bride wants to start off on **the wrong foot** with her **in-laws**.
