As a new year approaches and we say goodbye to 2023, I remain both grateful and hopeful. This past year, we focused on increasing capacity and strengthening our connections to the neighborhoods where we provide programming. In doing so, we were consistently reminded of the pivot that occurred nearly three years ago, the long-term impact that hybrid education has on the community, and our continued commitment to digital literacy and equity.

About two weeks before the pandemic, we were set to open our first location in downtown Waukesha. Despite the opening not matching what we had envisioned for in-person activity, we created connections as best as we could and started to build a presence in the area. Now in its third year of operation, our downtown Waukesha location has grown student enrollment by nearly 80%, seen our first-ever GED graduate from that location, and boosted capacity to serve even more students with the addition of more staff onsite.

All eight LSW locations have been noticing a continued demand for in-person programming over the last few years, and LSW has increased programming and services accordingly. Our commitment to our mission is evident. We are expanding accessibility, offering even more opportunities for adults to engage in ways that not only honor their lives, but consider how they

Україна в моєму серці

Україна в моєму серці -Ukraine is in my heart.

On February 24, 2022, Russia invaded Ukraine and as of November 14, 2023 there are 6,287,500 Ukrainian refugees globally. Yulia Tolchynska fled Ukraine with her two children in March 2022 and has carried Ukraine in her heart for almost two years as the war continues. Her story is one of resiliency, determination, and the transformative power of education.



Yulia is a successful businesswoman and is married to her high school sweetheart, Oleksii, who she has two children with, Oleksandr (14) and Valeria (11). Life was happy for the family of four in Zaporozhye, Ukraine, but as political tensions escalated and the echoes of distant artillery fire grew closer, Yulia and Oleksii knew she must leave the country with their children. Oleksii, like many other Ukrainian men, would have to stay behind and join the military. The next day, burdened with the weight of uncertainty, Yulia and her children boarded a train to Montenegro and soon thereafter, a plane to the United States.

Yulia's first goal upon moving in with her childhood friend in New Berlin, Wisconsin was to overcome the language barrier. She scheduled an appointment with Literacy Services in Waukesha where she enrolled in online classes and began virtual tutoring. She progressed quickly and became comfortable attending parent-teacher conferences, going to doctor appointments, and perhaps most importantly, talking to new American friends.

However, despite these early triumphs, the challenges continued. She juggled trying to run her business from a new country, single parent responsibilities and the relentless pursuit of learning English. But finally, good news came eight months after leaving Ukraine, when her husband, Oleksii, was able to join them in the United States and brought the family dog as a surprise. With the support of Literacy Services and job



placement programs he secured a job with Spectrum that allows him to provide for his family and practice his English skills every day.

Now, Yulia and her husband are planning for their future in the United States but hope to one day be able to return to Ukraine. The hope for a brighter future and the resilience to rebuild in the face of displacement define the refugee experience. Ukrainian refugees, like countless others across the world, carry pain but also bear the strength of their countries and cultures in their hearts.

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little. Additionally, I have an A1 level in German, from a few classes I took a couple of years ago.

Why did you come to the United States?

Before explaining my reasons I would like to mention that it was not an easy decision to make, and I had to encounter a strong feeling of fear and courage. To be honest, my primary reason was the urgent necessity of leaving my country, rather than coming specifically to the United States. I had to run away, not only from the economic limits but also from the oppression and the lack of liberty. This led me to consider the United States as my first option. And I was not wrong at all. I feel really pleased and fortunate to be here, welcomed with such a hearty reception by both this country and the people I have met.

How did you find Literacy Services of Wisconsin?

Due to my lack of official documents from my country and my aspiration to pursue a college degree here, I sought to validate my unofficial High School Diploma from Cuba or get an equivalent in the United States. My first step was to navigate the internet to gather information about my options, so that is how I found Literacy Services of Wisconsin and successfully obtained my High School Equivalency Diploma in a few weeks. However, I decided to enroll in English classes to improve my writing and reading skills, which has been one of the best choices I have made so far.

What programs are you participating in?

I am currently participating in the High School Equivalency Diploma for English Learners (HSED-EL) program. What I most like about this program is that it is quite comprehensive. Not only do I enhance my English skills, but also can learn about US history and discuss



science topics. This program is also free of charge, making it affordable and accessible for those who recently arrived in this country like me. And lastly, but just as crucially, the excellent and supporting teachers I have met in this program.

What are your educational goals?

As I mentioned earlier, my primary goal is to pursue a college degree, specifically one related to healthcare. That's why I enrolled in the university, as I want to obtain a Bachelor of Science in Nursing. Although I had started medical college in my home country, I am starting from scratch here. I knew that this would take a longer and more expensive journey, so I reconsidered my options and decided to pursue nursing. It's a rewarding career for several reasons and offers earlier entry to the workforce compared to becoming a physician. Becoming a nurse also meets my aspirations, and makes my educational journey a bit more affordable.

How has Literacy Services supported you in achieving your educational goals?

Literacy Services is supporting me in several ways. Firstly, it is providing me with preparation for college. While I completed high school in my native country and even took several college courses, I did so in a different language and a different educational system. I possess a good understanding of science and effective communication skills, but in Spanish, and this linguistic difference has created barriers. Literacy Services is helping me bridge the gap while becoming more familiar with the education

system in this country. At no cost, it is offering me access to high-quality training and education, focusing on my specific goals, which consist of attending college.

What are your career goals?

My first career goal is to achieve a bachelor's degree in nursing. Then, I would like to excel. I'm currently considering two options: one consists of pursuing a master's degree in nursing, while the other one involves a career switch to become a physician, specializing in dermatology, which has always been my dream job. However, I haven't made a final decision yet.

What are your hopes for the future?

In 10 years, I hope to be with my family again, visiting them frequently and sharing special moments with them - something I'm unable to do as much now. I hope to have realized my dream of becoming a nurse and making great progress in my field. I imagine my mother feeling proud and satisfied about what I've achieved so far. In addition to my personal goals, I also hope to have made several contributions to my community by that time. In the future, I see myself carrying more responsibilities, enriching my experience, working hard, staying focused on my goals, and holding a good steady job with better economic stability and balance between my professional and personal life. Furthermore, one of the things I have always wanted has been to travel and discover new cultures, so I hope I will have visited a couple of countries by that point.
